NAPLAN School Readiness Trials



Last week our Year 7 and 8 students undertook the NAPLAN 'School Readiness Tests' (SRT) to confirm we have everything in place to administer NAPLAN Online successfully and seamlessly for our Year 7 and Year 9 cohorts in 2019.

The focus of the school readiness test was not on assessing literacy and numeracy skills, but to test school readiness in terms of IT capacity as well as logistics and administration processes. Students performed two tests, one Writing test and one Omnibus test which is a combination of Numeracy, Language Conventions and Reading. The online testing platform also allowed students the opportunity to explore seven key ICT skills required, which align with the Australian Assessment, Curriculum and Reporting Authority's (ACARA) ICT general capabilities:

- Read the screen and navigate pages;
- Manipulate objects on a screen;
- Read and comprehend digital texts;
- Plan and compose text using word processing;
- Listen using a headset;
- Locate and select answers from a list;
- Type an answer in a text box.

Thank you to our Year 7 and 8 students for the way you conducted yourself during these trials; your positive disposition, persistence, flexibility and willingness to engage was appreciated.

helping the parents of teenagers with a developmental disability strengthen the relationship with their teens, increase parents' confidence in managing their behaviour, and encourage independence and resilience.

There is a new program beginning Tuesday 23rd October at 9.30am at Seton College. Places are still available. This will be the last group of 2018. The program is completely free and parent resources are provided.

The program will run at the school once per week, for two hours. The program is 8 weeks long with five weeks of face-to-face sessions. The additional sessions will be provided via three individual phone calls.
